INTRODUCTION

This annotated bibliography of 134 selected ILO tools for gender mainstreaming has been developed to support ILO staff and constituents as well as other development practitioners working to promote gender equality in the world of work.

The tools included in this bibliography have been compiled from across the ILO's sectors and field offices and have been organised in five categories comprising good practices; guidelines and training material; reports and case studies; discussion and working papers; briefing notes and information sheets; books; and audio-visual material. In addition to a brief description of each tool, a comprehensive list of reference data has been provided for ease of access, including web-addresses for tools available online.

The selection of the tools has been carried out in consultation with the ILO's global Gender Network, comprising gender specialists and focal points. Though not aiming to be exhaustive, the bibliography presents a representative cross-section of gender mainstreaming tools that have been developed by the ILO since 2000.

The bibliography has been compiled by the ILO's Bureau for Gender Equality. Special acknowledgement goes to Ms. Francesca Biasiato who drafted the bibliography and to the ILO's gender specialists in Addis Ababa, Bangkok, Beirut, New Delhi and Santiago for their contributions.
