2. In these Regulations “the Act” means the Immigration Act.

3. (1) The Philip S. W. Goldson International Airport, San Pedro Ambergris Caye Airstrip and Punta Gorda are hereby prescribed to be ports of entry and exit by air.

- Hunting and English Cayes. (3) Hunting Caye and English Caye are hereby prescribed to be places of entry and exit by sea for passengers brought into territorial waters of the country with the permission of the Director of Immigration for recreational purposes only.
- 61 of 1998. (4) The port and the airstrip in Big Creek, Independence Village, Stann Creek District, are hereby prescribed to be places of entry and exit by air and sea.
- Inspection of passports. 4. Subject to the provisions of the Act and of these Regulations the immigration officer shall inspect the passport of every person entering or leaving Belize, and if found in order shall affix to such passport the stamp of the Immigration Department, adding thereto his initials and the date.
- Passenger list. 5. The master of every vessel carrying any passenger to a port in Belize from any place outside Belize shall furnish to the immigration officer at the time of his visiting the vessel on arrival a list of his passenger.
- Examination of immigrants and emigrants. 6. For the purposes of sections 21 and 30 of the Act, the examination of persons shall be conducted by an immigration officer on the vessel by which such persons arrived or are leaving, or at any other place convenient for the

purpose as the immigration officer may direct.

7. (1) A temporary permit in lieu of a passport to leave and enter Belize for the purposes of travel to the border towns and villages of Mexico or Guatemala may be issued to persons belonging to Belize and to resident aliens on application made to the Director of Immigration at Belize or to the officer in charge of the police stations at Corozal, Orange Walk, San Ignacio, Benque Viejo del Carmen, Dangriga and Punta Gorda. Temporary permits.

(2) Where the applicant is not known to the immigration officer he may require proof in the form of a birth certificate or some other document of identity before issuing such a permit.

(3) Subject as herein provided a person to whom a temporary permit is granted under the provisions of this regulation shall pay in advance therefor a fee of five dollars on each occasion such permit is granted. The permit so granted shall remain valid for six months from date of issue: 28/1983.

Provided that the fee payable by any person under this sub-regulation or a part of such fee may from time to time be waived in writing by the Minister. 46/1983.

8. The temporary “pass” issued by the Mexican authorities of the state of Quintana Roo for visiting the border towns and villages of Belize may be accepted for entry and exit to those towns and villages in lieu of a passport Border, towns and villages.

9. (1) Written permission may be given by an immigration officer to persons resident in the border villages to enter Belize without a passport or other travel document for a visit not exceeding twenty-four hours to the nearest village or town or to the town of San Ignacio. For the purposes of these Regulations the border villages or towns are- Visitors.

(a) in Mexico-
Chetumal, Subteniente Lopez, Chac, Santa Lucia,
Sac Xaan, Ramonal, Esteves Mengel, Pucte,

Palmarcito, Xcopen, Cocoyol, San Francisco Botes, Buenavista, Santa Teresa, Chumaba, Estero Franco.

(2) The permits issued to such persons shall be returned to the immigration officer on their departure.

Excursionists.

10. The Director of Immigration may grant permission to the organiser of an excursion party to bring to and take out of Belize a party of excursionists without passports or travel documents:

Provided that the organiser submits to the immigration officer at the place of entry a list in duplicate of all the persons on such excursion and undertakes, at the expiration of their visit, to repatriate all persons on the excursion who do not belong to Belize.

11. (1) Every person entering Belize must be in possession of a valid passport except:

- (a) Commonwealth citizens who intend to visit the country for a period of not more than six months and who possess a return or round trip or touring tickets and such valid documents as will permit them to enter the country of their destination or from which they came;
- (b) Citizens of the United States of America who intend to visit Belize for a period of not more than six months and who possess return or round trip or touring tickets showing that their journey began

in the United States of America and that they are entitled to return there;

- (c) Cruise passengers of any nationality who intend to remain in Belize only during the stay of the vessel by which they arrived and to depart by the same;
- (d) Persons under the age of sixteen years who are included in the passport of some other person accompanying them;
- (e) Commonwealth citizens and citizens of the United States of America who arrive in the country overland and to whom tourist cards are issued by the immigration officer at the place of entry;
- (f) Any person who possesses a valid travel document issued by the Secretariat of the Caribbean Community;
- (g) Any person who possesses a valid travel document issued by any of the following countries:

(2) A document other than a passport may be accepted in lieu of a passport if it establishes to the satisfaction of the Immigration Officer, the identity and nationality of the bearer and if the Immigration Officer is otherwise satisfied that the applicant is authorised to return to the country from which he came, or

that he can gain admission to some other country.

12. (1) Every person entering Belize as a visitor is required to have visas issued by a diplomatic or consular officer of Belize or where Belize is not so represented by a diplomatic or consular officer of the country that acts on behalf of Belize in the country of issue except:

- (a) Citizens of Commonwealth countries;
- (b) Nationals of countries with which Belize has concluded visa abolition agreement;
- (c) Citizens of the United States of America entering Belize for a period not exceeding six months;
- (d) Persons who are passengers on tourist vessels and who intend to remain in Belize only during the stay of the vessel by which they arrived and to depart by the same;
- (e) Intransit passengers provided that such passengers do not intend to remain in Belize for more than seven days and are in possession of a ticket and of such valid documents as will permit them to enter the country of their destination;
- (f) Nationals of the European Economic Community (EEC).

(2) The Minister shall by notice published in the *Gazette* from time to time declare the countries with which Belize has concluded visa abolition agreements.

2. (1) For the purposes of the Schedule to these Regulations-

“entertainer” means a person whose profession is to provide entertainment to the public;

“general worker” means an unskilled worker and includes a full-time agriculture worker;

“professional worker” means a person holding a University degree in any subject;

“seasonal agriculture worker” means a person whose employment is for the duration of only one crop season;

“technical worker” means a worker who is skilled in any craft, trade, profession, vocation or calling, but who does not possess a University degree.

- (2) Where any dispute arises as to the category to which an applicant for employment permit belongs, the matter shall be referred to the Minister whose decision thereon shall be final.

3. (1) The non-refundable fees specified in Column III of the Schedule

annexed hereto shall be payable in respect of the permits or certificates specified in Column I of the said Schedule for the duration (if applicable) specified in Column II thereof

(2) All applications for the permits and certificates referred to herein shall as far as possible be processed and completed by the Immigration and Nationality Department within a period of four weeks.

(3) If an applicant for any of the permits or certificates contained in the Schedule hereto is in Belize at the time of making the application, such applicant shall make the application to the Immigration and Nationality Department in person, and shall personally collect any approved permit or certificate upon presentation of sufficient proof of identity.
