



Youth-orientated version of Convention No. 182: Activity to help imbed learning

This is a quick game to see if you can distinguish which situations are regarded as child labour and which are not called "OK OR NOT OK?".

- If you think an action is OK (not child labour), then mark the box on the left under Mr Red with his thumb up signalling ok.
- If you think an action is NOT OK (it is child labour), mark the box on the right under Mr Red with his hand out signalling stop.
- See if you can relate the actions that are child labour to descriptions of the worst forms of child labour. If a situation seems ambiguous, then discuss this with your friends considering all of the possibilities.
- Can you think of other examples of what is or is not acceptable? Discuss these with your friends.

	A family including 4 young children working together in the mines to earn money.
