Organization of a nationwide classroom based lessons under the theme "NO to child labour-YES to quality education" in 650 schools in Ulaanbaatar city and 21 aimags at same day and at same time using a newly produced video lesson emphasizing education as strategy to tackle child labour.  Organization of a press conference and a press release with the theme "NO to child labour – YES to quality education", by communication department of UNICEF and ILO  Launching of the results of a research work on the hazardous elements of a spring horse jockeys – research jointly supported by UNICEF and ILO.  Organization of a soccer competition (traditionally organized during every World Day in Ulaanbaatar city) and a dance competition among at-risk children, and the children involved in or withdrawn from the worst forms of child labour. NEPAL	•	WDACL brochure with key messages on "Child Labour in emergencies" will be developed by the ILO, Kathmandu in response to the child protection risks exacerbated by the devastating earthquake that hit Nepal on 25 April 2015. The messages will be around the global theme for 2015 and the Government-Department of Labour including Social Partners, UNICEF, and Protection Cluster Nepal will join hands together with the ILO to raise a collective voice against child labour and CALL IN all children back to school, who have been missing out on education since the devastating earthquake. 	•	Social partners are organising orientation programmes to their members prior to 12 June to make aware about the child labour issues during and post-emergencies like the recent earthquake. With the union members, the target is to reach out to at least 1000 children from the 14 affected districts who are working as child labourers or are at risk of entering into the worst forms child labour as a result of the earthquake. A team of union members will be mobilised in the public transportations, child friendly spaces, and temporary learning shelters and in places where people are temporarily living in tents in the week of 12 June to spread the awareness on child labour and risks associated with trafficking and sexual exploitation of children in the aftermath of the disaster.	
	•	A half-day programme on the "Role of Young Children in Minimising Child Labour" is being organised by the Trade union on 12 June in Kathmandu where more than 200 children are expected to participate and share their views and observations.	
	•	The District Child Welfare Board, Kavre together with the municipalities is organising quiz competitions, art workshops and street dramas for the children in the Child Friendly Spaces and Temporary Learning Shelters established in the earthquake affected areas. A signature campaign will be carried out to reassure the commitment of the Government and concerned stakeholders to stop child labour in Kavre on 12 June.
