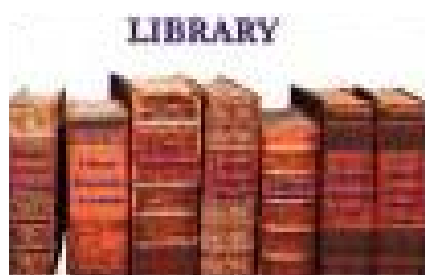

According to the Social Security Office (SSO) operational direction on the extension of social security to the informal economy, all persons who are not currently insured under the national social insurance scheme, or by other statutory schemes, should be provided with social security; hence the target of social security extension in this Technical Note includes all persons and workers presently not covered by statutory schemes.
