ABSTRACT

The Government of the Republic of the Philippines was optimistic that the anticipated resumption of the peace talks between the government and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) would result in the signing of a peace agreement. The Bank responded favourably to the request and sent a mission to determine whether there was enough donor interest in the Mindanao trust fund (MTF). The donors supported the idea and approved the recommendation of the mission to undertake a joint needs assessment (JNA) of the needs and priorities of the conflict-affected areas. The JNA is one of the manifestations of the World Bank's continuing commitment to achieving a peaceful and developed Mindanao, and for that matter, the Philippines. The results of the JNA team's effort will contribute to finding a peaceful solution to the conflict in Mindanao.

This paper looks at the extent and policy responses to the problem of labour shortage in the economies of Japan, Korea, Singapore, Hong Kong and Malaysia. The labour shortage has both economic and demographic roots in these economies, except in Malaysia where it is mainly of economic origin. Policy responses are categorized into raising productivity, extending employment, enlisting the inactive and unemployed, importing workers, offshoring and outsourcing, and improving fertility. The five countries undertook different mixes of policy responses to labour shortage with varying degrees of effectiveness.

Using various Philippine household survey data, this paper examines whether the outflow of overseas Filipino workers (OFWs) has resulted in poverty reduction - particularly for the migrants' families. It finds evidence that indeed it has: a proportionally smaller but still significant part of

new migrants are found to come from the lower income deciles; and, families who are able to send a migrant abroad are able to climb up the per capita income ladder quite rapidly. On the other hand, half of OFWs are found to come from the richest quintile, indicating that returns to migration is also likely contributing to inequality.

It points out that policy objectives are often ambiguous because several different agencies formulate and implement these policies, and that the same policies lack coherence with the country's broader development objectives.

The paper underscores the need for Thailand to acknowledge that labour migration in the country will remain at high levels for the next decade or two, and to change the incentive structure of the work permit system so that both migrants and employers find it beneficial to comply with it rather than work outside of it.
