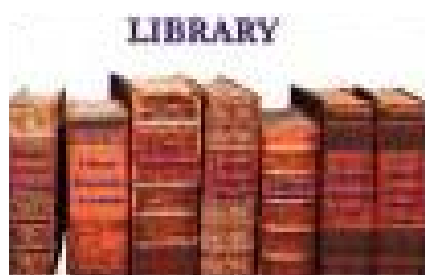

ABSTRACT

Domestic violence is found in all societies, at all levels of development, in all socio-economic groups and cultures. Violence against women and children (VAWC), especially if it occurs within the confines of the home, is considered a "family problem". To reveal its occurrence is a shame...a family scandal. Domestic violence is thus masked by a "culture of silence". It is this "culture of silence" that leads to a large-scale, systemic violence against women and child found in situation of conflict. The case studies reveal the pains and anguish of the survivors of gender violence. However, the responses of programmes to this critical area of concern through comprehensive, gender-sensitive, empowering interventions, and community engagement give us hope for the future as the good practices work towards the restoration of the sense of dignity and self-worth of survivors of VAWC.
