Ryder: Social justice, the smart solution to economic recovery



ILO Director-General, Guy Ryder, has called for "smart social policies" to tackle the global economic recovery which, he said, hangs in the "Tipping balance. that balance sustainable growth towards and development means tackling social injustice," he said, in a statement marking World Day for Social Justice. According to Ryder, "the world of work is now at the centre of discontent and must be an integral part in shaping a different, more just, global order for the future." Ryder

underlined his argument by referring to the dismal global situation the world of work is facing: 200 million unemployed, a further 870 million working poor, some 74 million unemployed youth, persisting child and forced labour and more than half of the world population having no social security at all. **Read more...**
