

COVID-19 and ENTERPRISES

Briefing Note [No. 28]

The crisis starkly demonstrates the relevance of changing the development paradigm in line with the 17 Sustainable Development Goals of the 2030 Agenda, particularly those relating to inequality. It is urgent to build back better with equality and environmental sustainability. A full global reset with political leadership to agree on a social compact between the public and private sectors, and society to reach universal social protection and create more resilient societies that are equipped to weather social, economic and environmental shocks is needed.

In May 2020, the ILO Global Business and Disability Network conducted two surveys – one for National Business and Disability Networks (NBDN) and one for those networks' company members – to identify good practices and gaps in responding to the COVID-19 crisis in a disability-inclusive way. In total, 159 companies from 22 countries (representing four regions) participated in the company survey, and 19 national networks participated in the NBDN survey.

The effect of Covid-19 on socio-economic disparities at global and national levels is worrying. The most vulnerable groups are bearing the brunt of the



economic crisis, among those are informal workers, low-waged, women, refugees, migrants etc.. This report by the United Nations Development Programme pleads for “The immediate introduction of a Temporary Basic Income for the world’s poorest people”; a minimum guaranteed income (cash transfer) above the poverty line for vulnerable people in 132 developing countries. The report states that it is feasible and necessary.

2. Government response for enterprises

ILO portal on the country policy responses

This ILO portal is being frequently updated to provide recent updates on the measures implemented by governments, employers' and workers' organizations, and the ILO by country and territory.

The EU's €750bn covid-19 plan is historic—but not quite Hamiltonian | 21 July 2020

The deal struck by the EU's 27 national leaders has two elements: the regular EU budget, or multiannual financial framework (MFF), worth nearly €1.1trn over seven years; and a €750bn “Next Generation EU” (NGEU) fund to help countries recover from the covid-19 recession. Rows over the second of these explain the summit's length. First, Europe's leaders agreed that the European Commission can incur debt at an unprecedented scale. Starting some time in 2021, the NGEU will be funded by borrowing over six years, with bonds at a range of maturities extending to 2058. Second, a total of €390bn will be distributed as grants, and hence will not increase recipient governments' debt burden. The recovery funds will be distributed to governments using an allocation key based on criteria such as unemployment and income per person.

The Economist: As the economy recovers fiscal policy has to shift | 11 July 2020

As they first battled the pandemic with lockdowns earlier this year, governments in the rich world pumped cash into the economy almost indiscriminately. Output was collapsing and the speed and scale of support rightly trumped any worries about its cost, accuracy or side-effects. Now lockdowns are easing, there are tentative signs of economic recovery (even in places where covid-19 is still raging) and political debate has shifted to whether, when, and how far to pare back these dauntingly expensive emergency fiscal policies.

Italie : La régularisation à durée déterminée des travailleurs migrants se poursuit | 19 July 2020

L'effort de régularisation temporaire des travailleurs en situation irrégulière se poursuit en Italie. [Lancé en mai](#) pour des raisons sanitaires face à la pandémie mais aussi pour pallier le manque de main-d'œuvre, la mesure concerne essentiellement les travailleurs opérant dans l'agriculture, l'élevage, la pêche et le travail domestique. Les délais de postulation ont désormais été prolongé jusqu'au 15 août. Les [résultats obtenus](#) semblent loin des résultats escomptés pour le gouvernement italien.

and safety in times of COVID-19. The recommendations draw attention both to the guidelines issued by tripartite entities such as EU-OSHA or ILO on the safe return to work and national-level sector recommendations/agreements.

France : « Face à l'urgence écologique et sociale, nous ne pouvons plus nous contenter des vœux pieux des grandes entreprises » | 30 June 2020

Un collectif rassemblant des associations écologistes et des syndicats demande dans une tribune au « Monde » à ce que le soutien de l'Etat à une grande entreprise soit assorti de conditions environnementales et sociales, inscrites dans la loi.

Suisse : la pandémie bénéficie à l'initiative sur les multinationales responsables | 22 July 2020

Depuis 2015, une initiative populaire visant à étendre la responsabilité des multinationales suisse relatif aux conséquences de leur activité et de celles des entreprises qu'elles contrôlent sur les droits de l'homme et de l'environnement tient en haleine le peuple suisse. Selon un sondage récent près d'un tiers des participants a un jugement plus positif sur le texte qu'avant la pandémie. « Cette période d'intenses bouleversements a ébranlé de nombreuses certitudes. C'est une occasion unique pour inclure davantage les droits humains dans la reconstruction » selon l'une des autrices de l'étude. Peut-être qu'une nouvelle ère se dessine.
