ILO Participation in the Jamboree

A team from ILO/IPEC – Jane Colombini, Gurchaten Sandhu and James Lambert (consultant) - set up and ran workshops and interactive activities in the “**Global Development Village**” and the “**Global Development Boulevard**”

The overall aims of the ILO workshops/activities were:

To sensitise scouts about children’s rights and child labour using participatory, arts-based activities;

To establish links with scouts and scout leaders from different parts of the world for future collaboration within the 12 to 12 Partnership Initiative.

The Global Development Village (GDV)

Each Jamboree participant joined the GDV for ½ day

Upon arrival, GDV participants engaged in a motivational “mass drumming” activity

From the range of 100 workshops offered, the participants were allocated into one of the following 4 zones:

Environment
Health
Human Rights
Peace

Arriving at each zone, scout patrol leaders were given numbers, corresponding to a workshop

ILO GDV Workshops on Child Labour

2 hour workshops (with around 20 participants) were held twice a day for 8 days

The workshops were facilitated by:
2 ILO staff +
1 or 2 IST volunteers

The aims of the workshops were:

- to inform scouts on the mandate, structure and functions of the ILO;
- to raise their awareness and understanding on the problem of child labour;
- to harness their creativity and empower them to take action upon their return home.

The Global Development Boulevard (GDB)

The Global Development Boulevard allowed all Jamboree participants (during their choice time), scout leaders and day visitors to explore further the range of issues brought in the Global Development Village.

In an active and participatory way, the interactive stands presented the issues dealt with by the organisation, the programmes and projects that it develops and the way in which young people can get involved.

The themes and subject were the same as those found in the Global Development Village

Scouts and other visitors to the ILO stand were invited to participate in 1 or more of the following 4 short activities:

1. Make Your Name Count – by reading a pledge and signing a large canvas young people were offered the opportunity to express their lifelong dedication to the worldwide movement against child labour and were encouraged to honour this commitment when they return to their home countries.

2. Who Helped Make This? –

Participants were invited to match a series of manufactured or consumer goods to an image of a child labourer engaging in the production of that consumer/manufactured good.

The aim was to enable participants to grasp and acknowledge the concepts of globalization and interdependence in the global economy.
