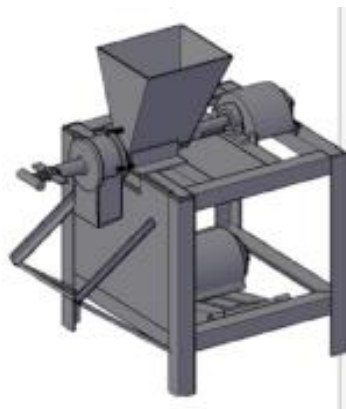

▶ A vast funding landscape for livelihood development

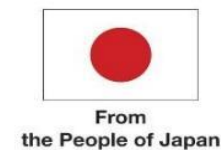
Various funding sources...

- ▶ Climate financing
- ▶ Bilateral donors, multilateral donors, and international financial institutions
- ▶ National and subnational budgets
- ▶ National banks and credit facilities
- ▶ Private sector
- ▶ Investors
- ▶ Corporate foundations

With different funding types...

- ▶ Grants
- ▶ Loans
- ▶ Government-run programs
- ▶ Investments and public-private partnerships





▶ Grant Assistance for Grassroots Human Security Projects (GGP)

“KUSANONE” = GRASSROOTS



- ▶ Small-scale projects directly benefiting the grassroots level
- ▶ Eligible Proponents: LGUs, NGOs, etc.
- ▶ 1989-2024: 562 grassroots projects assisted across PH

Advancing social justice, promoting decent work

Agriculture

- Construction or improvement of food processing centers
- Construction and/or procurement of pre- and post-harvest facilities/equipment
- Procurement of a delivery truck for transportation of fresh produce

Waste Management

- Procurement of garbage processing equipment
- Construction of Materials Recovery Facilities (MRF)

Capability Building

- Construction or renovation of training facilities
- Procurement of equipment for skills and livelihood training activities

► Grant Assistance for Grassroots Human Security Projects (GGP)

Sample projects supported under the small grants:

- Procurement of Pre- and Post-harvest Equipment for the Farmers of Municipality of Anao, Tarlac

Grant Assistance for Grassroots Human Security Projects (GGP)

Potential applications for Siargao:

▶ Government programs

DOLE: Tulong Panghanapbuhay sa Ating Disadvantaged Workers (TUPAD)

- ▶ Community-based assistance providing temporary wage employment in public projects
- ▶ Covers social community projects, economic community projects, agro-forestry community projects

DOLE: Integrated Livelihood Program (DILP)

- ▶ Access to grant assistance for capacity building in entrepreneurial ventures
- ▶ Covers 3 key components: 1) kabuhayan formation, 2) kabuhayan enhancement, and 3) kabuhayan restoration
- ▶ Covers a wide range of beneficiaries, including: low-waged and seasonal workers, women, youth, elderly, marginalized fisherfolk, marginalized and landless farmers, etc.

▶ Government programs

DTI: Livelihood Seeding Program

- ▶ Business development assistance to the community
- ▶ Covers MSMEs across various levels
- ▶ Scope of services: business registration, advisory services, capacity building, livelihood starter kits

DTI: Shared Service Facilities (SSF)

- ▶ Promoting innovation, increasing productivity, and improving MSME competitiveness under a shared system
- ▶ Cooperation, collaboration, and the pooling of resources
- ▶ Covers a wide range of proponents

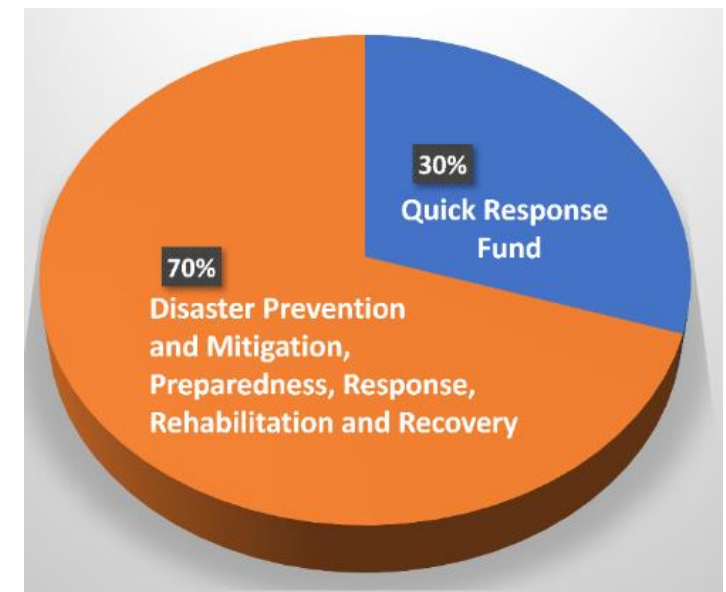
DTI: Industry Clusters

- ▶ Creating the conditions conducive to the growth and competitiveness of all members the industry

▶ Local Disaster Risk Reduction & Management Fund (LDRRMF)

JMC 2013-1 LDRRMF allocation and utilization

- ▶ Source: not less than 5% of the estimated local revenue from regular sources
- ▶ Allocation: 30% for quick response fund, 70% for 1) disaster prevention and mitigation, 2) preparedness, 3) response, 4) rehabilitation and recovery
- ▶ Utilization: (5.4) rehabilitation and recovery
- ▶ Obligation: the fund is obligated based on programs and projects aligned in the LGUs' Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Plans (LDRRMP) and integrated in the Annual Investment Program (AIP)

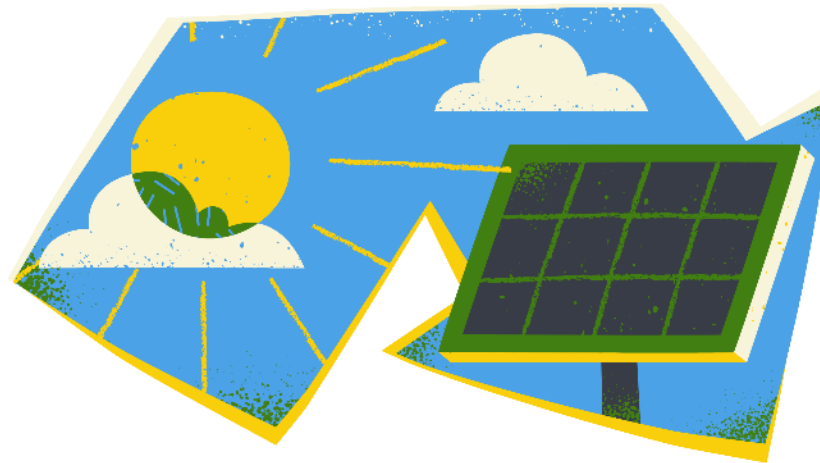
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Local Disaster Risk Reduction & Management Fund (LDRRMF)

Potential employment and livelihood applications in Siargao

- ▶ (5.4.4) Implementation of building code and promotion of green technology
- ▶ Post-disaster recovery: restoration and improvement of facilities, livelihoods and living conditions...following the principle of “building back better”



► Other local financing with applications for employment creation

Special education fund (SEF)

- (JC 2017-1) Construction, repair and maintenance of school buildings and other facilities for public elementary and secondary schools, which are deemed to have shortage of classrooms or of other facilities, as the case may be, per DepEd classroom deployment analysis, subject to existing standards/ specifications set by DepEd and/or Department of Public Works and Highways; furthermore, this item shall be given priority in the SEF Budget...
- (JC 2020-2) Installation of health areas or facilities, such as, but not limited to, school clinics and wash areas

Other local financing with applications for employment creation

Utilizing local resource-based approaches (e.g., CfW, community contracting)



Scholarships: financing windows for youth engagement in agriculture

Government scholarships for TVET/ skills certification training

Training for work scholarship program (TWSP)

- Courses in priority industries and major employment generators (e.g., agri-fishery, agribusiness, agro-industrial, tourism, IT-BPM, general infra, electronics, etc.)

Universal access to quality tertiary education (UAQTEA)

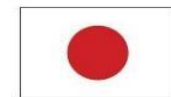
- Covers free tuition, school fees, competency assessment and tool kits for TVET courses in government-run TVIs

Private education student financial assistance (PESFA)

- Extends financial assistance to qualified students from marginalized HHs to receive post-secondary education and training in private TVIs

Special training for employment program (STEP)

- Training and certification assistance to promote employment and entrepreneurship
- Includes support for starter tool kits

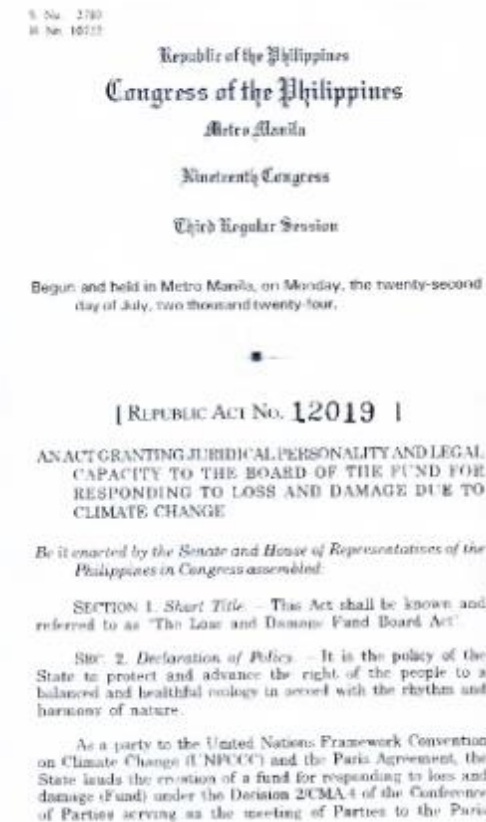

Fund for responding to loss and damage (FLD)

PH to host the Board of the FLD

- ▶ Loss and damage: adverse consequences brought about by climate change
- ▶ A global climate financing mechanism established under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC)
- ▶ Support to vulnerable countries that are disproportionately affected by climate-induced disasters
- ▶ Support to recovery and rehabilitation programs for economic loss and damage (e.g., livelihoods) and non-economic loss and damage (e.g., heritage and culture)
- ▶ Economic: loss and damage from 1) rapid onset events (e.g., typhoons) and 2) slow onset event (e.g., sea level rise, saltwater intrusion)



► Fund for responding to loss and damage (FLD)

- Unique and novel access modalities: Compared to other climate financing mechanisms, all developing countries can directly access resources from FLD, including through subnational, national and regional entities and through small grant funding for communities (Governing Instrument of the Fund)
- Pledges to date are at USD661M

Areas with potential support from the FLD*:

- Community-based adaptation projects (e.g., agro-forestry and intercropping initiatives)
- Climate-resilient infrastructure (e.g., livelihood and tourism applications of PV technology, climate-resilient processing facilities/ housing)
- Livelihood diversification initiatives (e.g., value addition)
- Post-disaster recovery and reconstruction
