Agenda of the International Labour Conference

Arrangements for the 113th Session (2025) of the Conference

► I. Introduction

1. The Governing Body confirmed at its 352nd Session (October–November 2024) that the 113th Session of the International Labour Conference will be held from 2 to 13 June 2025. This document contains information on the format and proposals for the structure, methods and programme of work for the session, following the guidance provided by the Governing Body at its 352nd Session and feedback provided at its 351st Session (June 2024). It also addresses practical improvements requested by Governing Body members in those discussions.
2. The proposed programme of work and arrangements have been prepared taking into consideration that the agenda of the 113th Session contains a number of important items, including the draft Programme and Budget for 2026–27, two standard-setting discussions and three resolutions submitted by the Governing Body on matters of considerable institutional importance. In accordance with established practice, the items on the agenda will be dealt with as indicated in the table below.

Venue

- The session will be held as usual in two venues: the ILO building and the Palais des Nations. Despite official confirmation from the Division of Administration of the United Nations Office at Geneva (UNOG) in July 2024 that renovation work on the Assembly Hall would be completed in time for the 2025 session of the Conference, the Office was informed in late November 2024 that due to delays in the renovation work, the Assembly Hall may not be ready in time for the Conference.
- The Office is therefore making contingency plans. Should the Assembly Hall renovation not be completed on time, as in 2024, plenary sittings will be held in Room XX. Due to the room's smaller capacity, seating arrangements will again need to be adapted accordingly to ensure the most inclusive tripartite participation for all delegations.

Participation

- In accordance with article 3(1) of the ILO Constitution, Member States must send complete tripartite delegations to Geneva, with a minimum composition of two Government delegates, one Employers' delegate and one Workers' delegate, bearing in mind the objective of achieving gender parity in delegations.

6. Employers' and Workers' delegates should arrive in Geneva in time to participate in their respective group's preparatory meetings on Sunday, 1 June.
7. The sittings will be conducted fully in person, with the option of remote attendance under the same arrangements that applied at the 2024 session:
 - plenary sittings will be streamed on the Conference website. Delegates who are unable to deliver their statement in person may do so instead through a pre-recorded video;
 - in committees, online participants may follow the proceedings remotely but will not be able to take the floor. There will be no remote connection for drafting groups or group meetings.

► II. Conference preparations

Early nomination of committee chairpersons

8. The Office launched the process for securing nominations for the Officers of the Conference and of committees in September 2024 with a view to obtaining them by 28 March 2025 at the latest. At the same time, the Office shared information with the regional coordinators on the tasks, expected skills and profile of chairpersons of Conference committees. It included the competencies requested by Governing Body members on several occasions, such as technical expertise in the subject under discussion, experience in conducting tripartite negotiations and good communication and consensus-building skills.
9. At its 352nd Session, several Governing Body members highlighted once again the importance of identifying suitable persons who are familiar with ILO tripartite meetings at an early stage, in view of the critical preparatory work that needs to be carried out in the months preceding each session of the Conference.

Consultations and information sessions

10. Noting the comments received from Governing Body members at its 352nd Session, the Office will prepare the proposed points for discussion for the general discussion item in consultation with the three constituent groups. The proposed points for discussion will be posted on the Conference website and adopted by the General Discussion Committee at its first sitting.
11. The Office will provide by early February 2025 a schedule of information sessions for Governments to prepare delegates. Information sessions on practical matters will be organized separately from briefings on substantive matters. They will be conducted in a hybrid format to allow for the participation of Government delegates based outside Geneva, particularly experts from capitals who are expected to participate in the committees. Governments are encouraged to ensure that information concerning these briefings reaches all relevant delegates.
12. Pre-Conference briefing sessions will include information on:
 - accreditation and registration procedures in the new system;
 - voting rules and procedures, including electronic voting in plenary;
 - how to register to make statements in the Conference plenary;
 - how to register in technical committees;

- programmes of work and working methods of technical committees, including how to submit amendments and the rules on discussing amendments.
13. To ensure that important procedural information reaches all Government delegates, additional briefing sessions on how to submit amendments and on voting procedures can be provided **during** the Conference.
 14. The Bureau for Employers' Activities and the Bureau for Workers' Activities will organize similar sessions for the Employers' and Workers' groups.
 15. The technical units responsible for the two standard-setting items have also started preparatory meetings with constituents to lay the groundwork for the smooth functioning of the corresponding technical committees and a successful outcome.

Timely dissemination of pre-session information and practical arrangements

16. The convocation letter for the 113th Session was sent in February 2025. In line with previous practice, the Office will post comprehensive information as early as possible on the Conference website, which will be regularly updated as information becomes available in the run-up to the session. Technical committees will each have a dedicated web page.
17. The *Conference Guide*, to be published before the opening of the session, will compile information already available on the website, including details on practical arrangements. It will include information on matters such as registration and physical access to the venues, transport, catering and the use of technological tools. Printed copies will be made available to delegates upon registration.

► III. Accreditation and registration procedures

18. As requested by the Governing Body at its 352nd Session, the possibility for staff of Permanent Missions to collect badges for all Government delegates by proxy will be maintained, subject to the necessary authorization. In addition to a **new conference management and accreditation system** that will be introduced, the following arrangements that were implemented in 2024 will remain in place:
 - dedicated desks assigned to those delegations collecting badges by proxy;
 - early opening of the registration desk on the Thursday preceding the opening of the Conference (29 May), which will remain open on the two weekends of the Conference, including Sundays, to assist delegates arriving over the weekend.
19. The Office has taken careful note of the feedback received from members of the Governing Body at its 352nd Session on the difficulties delegates encountered in uploading the photographs for badge collection by proxy. The roll-out of the new conference management system is expected to address most of the technical difficulties identified.
20. As the ILO is subject to United Nations (UN) security guidelines, it will be possible to obtain badges by proxy provided that delegates:

- submit credentials by **Monday, 12 May 2025**¹ – access codes to the online accreditation system will be sent to all Member States, through their Permanent Missions in Geneva or directly to their capitals, in the week of 28 April 2025;
 - provide a photograph meeting the technical requirements set by the UN;
 - provide verified individual email addresses to receive the personal codes necessary to access the electronic voting, the online system for submitting amendments and the ILO Events app.
21. To exercise their voting and participation rights, all delegates must be accredited and have **registered** by collecting their Conference badges, including Geneva-based delegates already in possession of a permanent UN or ILO badge.

► IV. Voting

22. During the 113th Session, the following items will require a vote in plenary in order to be adopted by the Conference:
- the draft Programme and Budget for 2026–27;
 - the proposed Convention and Recommendation concerning protection against biological hazards in the working environment;
 - possible amendments to the Code of the Maritime Labour Convention, 2006 (MLC, 2006) (subject to the outcome of the meeting of the Special Tripartite Committee in April 2025).
23. If a Member State in arrears submits a request to recover the right to vote, the Conference will also need to vote on it. Any such vote would need to be conducted in the first week to enable the Member State concerned to participate in the above-mentioned votes.
24. The Office will provide all the necessary information and guidance before and during the votes. In accordance with article 22(2) of the *Standing Orders of the International Labour Conference*, only participants who are physically present at the Conference and have collected their access badge will be registered as attending the Conference for the purpose of determining the quorum for votes.
25. In technical committees, any voting needed will normally be carried out by a show of hands. In the event that a record vote is required under article 42(5) of the Standing Orders, it will be taken by roll call.

► V. Conference plenary

26. As in previous sessions, the Conference plenary will consist of five parts: the opening sitting; the discussions of the Reports of the Director-General (including the appendix on the situation of workers of the occupied Arab territories), and of the Chairperson of the Governing Body; a high-level event; the adoption of committee outcomes; and the closing sitting.

Opening sitting

27. The session will open in the morning of Monday, 2 June. At its opening sitting, the Conference will elect its Officers, constitute its committees, adopt its programme of work and take any other steps that may be required to set its work in motion. This will include adopting a decision concerning the admission of statements in committees by employers or workers of Myanmar as representatives of an international employers' or workers' organization.² As is customary, the Chairperson of the Governing Body and the Director-General will address the Conference, as will the Chairpersons of the Employers' and Workers' groups. Committees will start their work at 3.30 p.m. on the same day.

Discussion of the Reports of the Chairperson of the Governing Body and of the Director-General

28. The discussion of the Reports of the Chairperson of the Governing Body for the period June 2024–June 2025 and of the Director-General will begin on Wednesday, 4 June and end on Wednesday, 11 June. This will allow for at least 11 sittings, with speeches of a maximum of 5 minutes.
29. The theme of this year's Report of the Director-General report is jobs, rights and growth. It will be published by the second week of May.
30. Registration in the list of speakers will open on 2 May 2025. Requests will be dealt with subject to the receipt of the corresponding credentials and to any adjustments to the programme of work of the plenary that may become necessary in the course of the Conference.

High-level event

31. The Forum of the Global Coalition for Social Justice will take place on Thursday, 12 June with a similar format to the one of the 112th Session. The side event to celebrate the World Day against Child Labour will be held one day earlier (see Part VII).
32. The Forum will provide a space for Coalition partners to present activities implemented in a collaborative manner under the auspices of the Coalition and its thematic development. It will also allow Coalition partners to share knowledge, tools and experiences.

Adoption of committee reports and outcomes, votes and closing ceremony

33. The schedule for the adoption of the reports and outcomes of committees will be as follows:
- Thursday, 5 June: General Affairs Committee (draft resolutions on Palestine and Myanmar and the amendments to the MLC, 2006);
 - Monday, 9 June: General Affairs Committee (outcome concerning the tripartite input to the Second World Summit for Social Development) and Finance Committee;
 - Thursday, 12 June: General Discussion Committee;
 - Friday, 13 June: the two Standard-Setting Committees, the Credentials Committee and the Committee on the Application of Standards.

34. Where a vote is required for the adoption of certain committee outcomes mentioned in paragraph 22 above, it will be conducted on the day on which the related outcome is scheduled for adoption.
35. The Office was encouraged at previous sessions to set time limits for statements so that the adoption of the reports of the technical committees and of the Committee on the Application of Standards would remain within the 90 minutes allocated. The following time limits will continue to apply for statements:
 - Committee Chairperson and Reporter: 15 minutes combined;
 - Employer and Worker Vice-Chairpersons of each committee: 10 minutes each;
 - representatives of regional groups: 5 minutes each;
 - individual delegates: 2 minutes each.
36. The session of the Conference will close with the speeches of the Officers of the Conference and the Director-General.

► VI. Committees

Standing committees

37. Since 2023, groups have been encouraged to nominate a substitute for their respective members of the **Credentials Committee** to ensure the continuity of the Committee's work.³
38. In addition to administrative matters, the **Finance Committee** will be considering the draft Programme and Budget for 2026–27 to be adopted by the Conference. It will therefore need to hold at least two sittings, the first of which on Tuesday, 3 June, and the second, as is customary, on Friday, 6 June, to approve the US dollar/Swiss franc budgetary exchange rate for 2026–27. Its report will be presented to the plenary on Monday, 9 June, followed by the record vote on the programme and budget. If the Committee receives any requests from a Member State in arrears to recover the right to vote, it will need to submit a first report to the plenary on Friday, 6 June, to allow the Conference to vote on the request. If approved, the Member State concerned would then be able to participate in the votes scheduled on Monday, 9 June and Friday, 13 June.
39. The **General Affairs Committee** will consider four items:
 - the draft resolution concerning the ILO's tripartite input to the Second World Summit for Social Development;
 - the draft resolution on the status of Palestine in the ILO and participation rights of Palestine in ILO meetings;
 - the measures under article 33 of the Constitution to secure compliance by Myanmar with the recommendations of the Commission of Inquiry;
 - the approval of the amendments to the Code of the MLC, 2006.

40. To complete its work, the Committee will require at least four sittings, to be scheduled from Monday, 2 to Wednesday, 4 June, with the following programme of work:
- Monday, 2 June: one sitting to consider amendments to the Code of the MLC, 2006, and the draft resolutions concerning Palestine and Myanmar;
 - Tuesday, 3 June: one or two sittings, as required, to conclude the discussion on the draft resolutions on Palestine and Myanmar;
 - Wednesday, 4 June: one or two sittings, as required, to consider the draft resolution concerning the tripartite input to the Second World Summit for Social Development and closing remarks.
41. The **Committee on the Application of Standards** is expected to continue with its customary programme of work starting in the afternoon of Monday, 2 June until the morning of Thursday, 12 June inclusive, with additional (evening) sittings when necessary. The Committee will consider 24 individual cases and hold a special sitting on the application by Belarus of the Freedom of Association and Protection of the Right to Organise Convention, 1948 (No. 87), and the Right to Organise and Collective Bargaining Convention, 1949 (No. 98), in application of the resolution adopted by the International Labour Conference at its 111th Session (2023).
42. Further adjustments to the Committee's working methods will be determined by recommendations arising from the informal tripartite consultations to be organized following the 353rd Session of the Governing Body.

Technical committees

43. The technical committees are expected to hold their first sitting in the afternoon of Monday, 2 June and complete their work by Wednesday, 11 June. The schematic programme of work contained in the appendix, which is based on past practice, is purely indicative and will be developed further in consultation with the Officers of each committee.
44. The **Standard-Setting Committee on Biological Hazards** will undertake its second discussion with a view to submitting the final text of a Convention and a Recommendation to the Conference for adoption. As illustrated in the appendix, the following programme of work is proposed:
- Monday, 2 June: submission of the first batch of amendments to the draft instruments and first sitting, devoted to general statements.
 - Tuesday, 3 to Tuesday, 10 June: three sittings a day for the consideration of amendments (based on recent experience of standard-setting committees).
 - Depending on progress made by the committee in the adoption of the amendments to the draft instruments, the Drafting Committee – composed of members of the Standard-Setting Committee on Biological Hazards – could start meeting on Friday, 6 June, after the committee's evening sitting, and hold a final sitting on Tuesday, 10 June.
 - Wednesday, 11 June: the last sitting for the adoption of the final texts of the instruments as reviewed by the Drafting Committee ⁴ and for closing remarks. Should the Committee need to continue the consideration of amendments on 11 June, the Drafting Committee would need to hold its final sitting that evening. In that case, the Committee may decide to delegate

authority to its Officers to adopt the final texts, as provided for in article 48(3) of the Standing Orders. The Committee would have to explicitly decide to do so, once it had finished considering all amendments to the texts, and before closing its final sitting.

45. In accordance with article 48(6) of the Standing Orders, the final vote for adopting a new standard “shall not take place before the day following that on which the text approved by the Committee has been made available to delegates and in no case less than 14 hours after the text has been made available”. Therefore, for the final vote to take place in plenary in the morning of 13 June, the text would have to be made available by 8 p.m. on 12 June at the latest.
46. **The Standard-Setting Committee on Decent Work in the Platform Economy** will carry out its first discussion with a view to adopting Conclusions to be submitted to the Conference for adoption. The proposed programme of work is as follows:
 - Monday, 2 June: submission of the first batch of amendments to the proposed Conclusions and first sitting, devoted to general statements.
 - Tuesday, 3 to Wednesday, 11 June: three sittings a day for the consideration of amendments (based on recent experience of standard-setting committees).
 - Depending on progress made by the Committee in the adoption of the amendments to the proposed Conclusions, the Drafting Committee – composed of members of the Standard-Setting Committee on Decent Work in the Platform Economy – could start meeting on Friday, 6 June, after the committee’s evening sitting, and hold a final sitting on Wednesday, 11 June, at the latest.
 - Thursday, 12 June: a final sitting for the adoption of the proposed Conclusions as reviewed by the Drafting Committee⁵ and closing remarks. Should the Committee need an evening sitting to conclude its consideration of amendments on 11 June, the Drafting Committee would need to meet on 12 June. In that case, the Committee may decide to delegate the authority to adopt the final text of the proposed Conclusions to its Officers, once all amendments have been considered and before closing its final sitting on 11 June.
47. In response to the reiterated requests from constituents to explore ways of avoiding late-night sittings of the Drafting Committee, it is proposed to provide the possibility of scheduling a sitting of the Drafting Committee to review the documents of each standard-setting committee on Sunday, 8 June. However, as only the parts of texts adopted during the first week of the session will be ready for review by Sunday, 8 June, late sittings of the Drafting Committee will likely be required during the second week. All the information concerning the work of the Drafting Committee will be posted on the web page of each of the two standard-setting committees.
48. The proposed programme of work for the **General Discussion Committee on Promoting Transitions towards Formality** is similar to that of the general and recurrent discussion committees at the last two sessions of the Conference:
 - Afternoon of Monday, 2 June, and morning and afternoon of Tuesday, 3 June: general debate based on the points for discussion.
 - Late evening of Wednesday, 4 June: tentative conclusions prepared by the Office are distributed to the groups.

- Thursday, 5 and Friday, 6 June: drafting group meets to prepare the draft conclusions.
 - Saturday, 7 June: submission of amendments to the draft conclusions.
 - Monday, 9 to Wednesday, 11 June: consideration of the amendments in full committee. The General Discussion Committee must complete its work on 11 June to be able to submit its outcome to the Conference on Thursday, 12 June.
- 49.** Following established practice, the drafting group responsible for preparing draft conclusions will be composed of eight members from each of the three groups of constituents, each accompanied by one adviser. Groups are encouraged to have their nominations ready by the second day of the session (Tuesday, 3 June). The text of the tentative conclusions will be provided by the Secretariat in English, French and Spanish before the drafting group begins its work. Interpretation will be available in those languages during its sittings; however, the drafting group will work on the basis of the English version of the text, which will be the only language displayed during its sittings.
- 50.** As in previous years, the drafting group is likely to need evening sittings to complete its work. In most recent sessions, this has resulted in extremely long sittings ending after midnight, and on a few occasions even extending beyond the time until which interpretation is available. Consequently, the Secretariat has been required to work throughout the night to finalize the draft conclusions in the three languages, which were published early in the morning of the day on which amendments had to be submitted. As highlighted by constituents on several occasions, every effort should be made to discontinue such practices, which can be harmful to the well-being of delegates and staff. As part of these efforts, it is proposed to schedule an evening sitting of the drafting group until 10 p.m. on the Thursday and to close its last sitting on the Friday by 8 p.m., and to leave in brackets all the parts of the text on which no consensus was reached within the time allotted.

Proposed measures to improve time management

- 51.** In response to the ongoing requests from constituents to limit the frequency and duration of evening sittings of the three technical committees, every year the initial programme of work for each committee, prepared in consultation with constituents, includes only a limited number of evening sittings, which are expected to end by 9 p.m. Nevertheless, experience has shown that it is impossible to adhere to this schedule during the session. For the 113th Session, it is therefore proposed that the programme of work of each technical committee, to be finalized in consultation with the Officers of the committee, include evening sittings until 10 p.m. This proposal is based on lessons learned from previous sessions and on the following considerations:
- In the two standard-setting-committees, which begin the discussion of amendments on the Tuesday of the first week, it would be preferable to have evening sittings on the Tuesday to the Saturday of the first week so as to complete the discussion of the sections of the text that are scheduled each day and to have as much text as possible ready to be reviewed by the Drafting Committee on the Sunday. This would mean holding evening sittings on five days during the first week and only two or three days ⁶ in the second week, which would be the best use of the time available.

- The Drafting Committee may, as a contingency measure, hold any additional sittings that may be necessary during the second week to ensure timely completion of its work in relation to the two standard-setting items. As the possibility of holding sittings of the Drafting Committee in parallel with committee sittings has not received support from constituents in the past, the Drafting Committee may need to meet in the mornings or at lunchtime.
 - For the General Discussion Committee, evening sittings are likely to be required on the Monday and Tuesday of the second week when it considers the draft conclusions.
 - For all three technical committees, evening sittings should be avoided on the last day of the discussion of amendments to ensure that there is enough time to prepare the final documents in the three languages for timely web posting before they are considered by the Conference in plenary.
- 52.** To maximize the time available to the committees, the following measures, which were well received by the Governing Body at previous discussions, will continue to be implemented:
- Information will be provided through documents posted on the committee web page rather than during the committee's opening sitting.
 - A time monitoring device will be used to apply time limits to statements made during the general debate to avoid late sittings.
 - Governments will be encouraged to express their positions through regional group statements.
 - Information notes will be provided on matters relating to terminology to avoid lengthy debates over terms on which there was no common understanding.
 - Protracted debates on contentious amendments will be suspended and resumed only after the parties have consulted outside the sittings so as to allow the discussion of other amendments to advance. For this purpose, the Chairperson, in consultation with the two Vice-Chairpersons, could identify committee members who are particularly active in the discussion who could be convened rapidly to negotiate possible compromise solutions to be proposed to the Committee.

► VII. Celebration of the World Day against Child Labour

- 53.** The World Day against Child Labour will be commemorated on Wednesday, 11 June. Following the reform of the Conference and the request from constituents to avoid disruptions to the work of the plenary and technical committees, this has been the only side event authorized to take place during the Conference since 2015.

► VIII. Outlook for the 2026 session of the Conference

- 54.** Due to the ongoing renovation works in the Palais des Nations, the 114th Session (2026) of the Conference will have to take place at a different venue in Geneva. In line with the discussion held by the Governing Body at its 335th Session (March 2019) on the arrangements for the

Conference during the renovation works in the Palais des Nations, ⁷ discussions are ongoing with the Swiss authorities on the use of the Palexpo convention centre in Geneva. Further information will be provided to the Governing Body at its 355th Session (November 2025).

► Draft decision

55. The Governing Body:

- (a) **endorsed the proposed programme of work appended to document GB.353/INS/2/2(Rev.1), subject to any adjustments that might be necessary until its adoption by the International Labour Conference at the opening sitting of the 113th Session;**
- (b) **requested the Office to implement all the arrangements outlined in the document, in particular the measures to improve time management set out in paragraphs 51 and 52, taking into account the guidance provided.**
