PROGRAMME SUMMARY

The Pacific Climate Change Migration and Human Security (PCCMHS) programme Phase II builds upon the outcomes of Phase I of the programme, implemented from 2019-2022, while drawing on its lessons learned and experiences. During its implementation, Phase II of the programme will contribute to strengthened resilience and adaptive capacity of Pacific Islanders in the context of climate change and disasters, ensuring that migration and relocation remains a choice, and displacement is averted, minimized and addressed. The programme will support the following outcomes:

- i. Governments cooperate at the (Pacific) regional and sub-regional level to manage climate mobility.
- ii. Pacific Governments develop and implement national policies to address climate mobility.
- iii. Pacific civil society actors, worker and employer organizations, and communities actively engage in national, regional and global processes to manage climate mobility.

These outcomes will be achieved through the creation of enabling policy environments; improving availability of relevant data and evidence; building capacity of various stakeholders; and improving access to services. The programme will engage with Pacific Governments, non-government stakeholders and at-risk communities. The programme will continue to promote action to comprehensively address climate mobility including labour migration and other voluntary movements, displacement and planned relocation efforts in the context of slow and sudden onset disasters.

BENEFICIARIES

Pacific communities affected by climate change related migration, displacement, planned relocation; Pacific national and sub-national government officials; migrant workers, worker and employer organizations; civil society and community-based organizations.
