

## **Presentations per topic**

Participants agreed that the new development framework should be global and relevant for all countries, irrespective of their level of development. The new agenda should not adopt a 'one-size-fits-all' approach, characteristic to that of the Washington consensus era, as well as to some extent adopted by MDGs, but it must be oriented toward public policy goals, based on indicators amenable to policy action. In their presentations and open debate, discussants addressed few issues of concern to be considered.
