At the end of the project: (1) national policies, legislation and judicial procedures will be geared to address the issue of trafficking in children, (2) in selected high risk areas, mechanisms to reduce the vulnerability of children to trafficking will be in place and the quality and range of services for long-term reintegration of child victims will have been improved, (3) a sub-regional information exchange network will be operational and will support and strengthen existing regional structures.

By the end of the project (1) national policies, legislation and judicial procedures will be geared to address the issue of trafficking in children (2) in selected high risk areas, mechanisms to reduce the vulnerability of children to trafficking will be in place and the quality and range of services for long-term reintegration of child victims will have been improved and (3) a sub-regional information exchange network will be operational and will support and strengthen existing regional structures. This project is linked to the earlier project funded by Germany "Prevention & Reintegration Programme to Combat Trafficking of Children for Labour & Sexual Exploitation in Balkans & Ukraine" and "Combating trafficking in children for labour and sexual exploitation in the Balkans and Ukraine" funded by the United States.			
Bipartite and Tripartite Action against Child Labour	01 June 2006	30 June 2010	Norway
Objective: This projects aim at strengthening tripartite and joint worker-employer action against child labour by strengthening the capacity of the constituents, promoting cooperation and formation of tripartite bodies. The ILO's Bureau for Employers' activities (ACT/EMP) through this project, will contribute to the enhanced capacity and participation of employers' organizations and their members in national efforts aimed at combating child labour and especially its worst forms. The programme will target specifically the agricultural sector (including fisheries) and the mining sector, which are sectors where a great deal of child labour is found and which are of relevance to employers' organizations in the selected countries. By the end of the project it is expected that: (1) Employers' organizations and their members have acquired a better awareness and understanding of child labour and demonstrate a greater commitment toward its elimination, (2) Employers' organizations have strengthen their capacity to plan, implement, monitor and evaluate actions to combat child labour in liaison with their members and other relevant stakeholders and (3) Employers' organizations contribute to national efforts to eliminate child labour. The ILO's Bureau for Workers' activities (ACTRAV), through this project will also aim: (1) to support Trade Unions to contribute to the elimination of the worst forms of child labour, and to the gradual elimination of all forms of child labour, (2) strengthen the capacity of trade unions to contribute to bipartite and tripartite action against child labour through the development of comprehensive trade union policy, strategy and action and (3) strengthen the capacity of trade unions in less developed countries in general, using child labour as a tool. To this effect, by the end of the project: (1) National trade union centres will have developed policy, strategies and action plans on combating child labour (2) a ILO child labour approach through cooperation and coordination with ACT/EMP and IPEC will have been created, (3) a trade union network on child labour, for exchange of information and coordination of actions will have been established and (4) synergy effects between the two prioritized donor			

issues, child labour and social dialogue will have been created.			
Trafficking and other Worst Forms of Child Labour in Central and Eastern Europe (Phase II)	30 September 2006	31 July 2010	United States
Objective: This project will contribute to the reduction and elimination of trafficking and other worst forms of child labour (WFCL) in Albania, Bulgaria, Kosovo (as defined by the UN Security Council Resolution no. 1244), Moldova, Romania and Ukraine. At the end of the project: (1) country wide upscaling of IPEC models of prevention / identification / referral and rehabilitation / tracking, through capacity building of institutions and greater involvement of employers will have increased the outreach of institutions to eliminate worst forms of child labour,(2) 4500 children will have been either prevented or withdrawn from the Worst Forms of Child Labour in sectors/areas previously not addressed by IPEC interventions and (3) mainstreaming of WFCL into national policies and legislation, and awareness raising / mobilisation activities will have supported an increase of resources allocated to the elimination of the worst forms of child labour.			
Project development, awareness raising and support for the implementation of the global action plan to eliminate the worst forms of child labour by 2016	01 May 2008	30 September 2013	United States
Objective: This project will contribute to targeted action by member States by enabling ILO-IPEC to plan, design and provide support in the context of the Global Plan of Action to national action on child labour and to the worldwide movement through global and regional mainstreaming and knowledge sharing and awareness raising through World Day Against Child Labour (WDACL). At the end of this project: (1) new projects with improved quality will have been designed and selected projects will have received direct beneficiary monitoring support, (2) WDACL activities in a number of countries will have contributed to enhanced awareness raising and mobilization of key individuals and communities and (3) specific capacity will have been strengthened at the national, regional and global level in support of targets set forth in the Global Action Plan.
