Maruja M. B. Asis

Maruja Asis is Executive Director of the Scalabrini Migration Center (SMC) in Manila, and editor of the Asian and Pacific Migration Journal. She has long been involved in researching migration and social change in Asia. Her research has contributed to academic and public policy debates around migration and development, migration governance, and transnational migration and family impacts. Her recent empirical work examined recruitment systems and their outcomes on labor migration governance, bilateral cooperation and worker protection; sustainable agriculture as an alternative to migration for young Filipinos; and Southeast Asian fishermen working on Taiwanese fishing vessels.



Mohammed Dito

Mohammed Dito is a labour market researcher. His main research interests are migration, youth employment and labour market governance. From 1998 to 2005 he was Head of Employment Service Bureau at the Bahrain Ministry of Labour, and currently acts as a Vice President in the Policy Directorate to the Bahrain Labour Market Regulatory Authority. He has published widely on migration in the GCC states, the kafala system and beyond.

Gioconda Herrera

Gioconda Herrera is Professor in the Department of Sociology and Gender Studies at the Facultad Latinoamericana de Ciencias Sociales (FLACSO Ecuador). Her research revolves around questions on the effects of globalization on social inequalities in Latin America. She has analysed the new migratory processes of the Andean region to Europe and the United States, especially of women and indigenous peoples, and also the migratory returns and circularities that have taken place as a result of the crisis of 2008. She is currently investigating the post-deportation life of indigenous migrants in rural communities of Ecuador. She is also a member of a comparative research team of eight countries on Venezuelan migration in Latin America. She coordinates the doctorate of Andean Studies of FLACSO Ecuador and since 2016, she is an associate editor of the Latin American Research Review in the area of sociology.



Joanna Howe

Dr Joanna Howe is an Associate Professor in Law at the University of Adelaide and a consultant with Harmers Workplace Lawyers. She is project leader on a number of significant Australian research grants, including one for the horticulture industry (2016) and another for the Fair Work Ombudsman (with Prof Alex Reilly) examining the experience of international students in the Australian workplace (2016). Joanna is also a chief-investigator on an Australian Research Council Discovery Project investigating the incidence of unpaid work experience and internships in Australia (2015-2018). Joanna is also a research collaborator on a grant from the Canadian Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council examining gender, migration and the work of care in Oceania. Her edited collection *Temporary Labour Migration in the Global Era* (with Prof Rosemary Owens) is the seminal international work on the regulation of transnational migration flows between countries on a temporary basis, and her monograph *Rethinking Job Security* (Routledge, 2017) provides a three country study of unfair dismissal law.



Sandra Lavenex

Sandra Lavenex is Professor of European and International Politics at the University of Geneva, Switzerland. She is currently running three big research projects: i) with Joachim Blatter Migration Governance through Trade Mobilities, studying the drivers and patterns of migration governance in European and Asian trade agreements, paying particular attention to the creation of new migrant categories and their discrimination potential; ii) EU Horizon 2020 'EU-IDEA Integration and Differentiation for Effectiveness and Accountability; and iii) EU Horizon 2020 Jean Monnet Comparative Network on Externalisation Policies. Her latest book is *Democracy in the Age of Globalization and Mediatization*, with H. Kriesi, F. Esser, J. Matthes and M. Buehlmann (Palgrave, 2013).



Philip L. Martin

Philip Martin is Professor Emeritus of Agricultural and Resource Economics at the University of California, Davis, United States. His research focuses on: immigration, farm labour, and economic development. Prof. Martin has earned a reputation as an effective analyst who can develop practical solutions to complex and controversial migration and labour issues. In the U.S., he was the only academic appointed to the Commission on Agricultural Workers to assess the effects of the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. He assessed the prospects for Turkish migration to European Union between 1987 and 1990, and evaluated the effects of immigration on Malaysia's economy and its labour markets in 1994-95. In 2001-02, he assessed the options for dealing with unauthorized migration into Thailand. Martin is Chair of the University of California's Comparative Immigration and Integration Program, and editor of the monthly Migration News and the quarterly Rural Migration News.



Etienne Piguet

Etienne Piguet is Professor of Geography at the University of Neuchâtel, Switzerland. He is vice-president of the Swiss Federal Commission on Migration (appointed by the Swiss Federal Council), Chair of the Commission on Population Geography of the International Geographical Union (IGU) and Chair of the Swiss Committee of the International Geographical Union. He acted as Review Editor for the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) of United Nations (WMO/UNEP – WG2 AR5, chapter 13) and is member of several scientific associations and committees including the Swiss Association of Geography (steering committee), the Association of American Geographers and the Société suisse d'études africaines. Etienne Piguet's research projects have been conducted in Switzerland, Niger, Senegal and in Latin America. He has worked in collaboration with international organizations such as the OECD, ILO, IOM, UNHCR, and national bodies such as the Federal Office for Migration, Swiss Federal Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA), Proclim, the Commission for Research Partnerships with Developing Countries (KFPE), and others.



Ludger Pries

Prof. Ludger Pries is Chair of Sociology/Organisation, Migration, Participation at Ruhr-University Bochum. His field of expertise includes sociology of work, organisations and migration in comparative perspective, transnationalism and globalisation research; research and teaching in Germany, Spain, Mexico, Brazil and the USA; successful application of almost 20 research projects with competitive review and selection processes with a total budget of almost €3 million. He has published 14 books (5 co-authored), more than 60 articles in scientific journals, and is associate editor of the journal *Global Networks*. Prof. Pries is also speaker of the Section Migration and Ethnic Minorities in the German Association of Sociology.



Ronald Skeldon

Ronald Skeldon is an Emeritus Professor in the Department of Geography, University of Sussex and Honorary Professor in the Graduate School of Governance, Maastricht University. He joined the University of Sussex in 2000, where he remained until 2017. Other activities post 2000, have included a secondment to the Department for International Development in the UK (DfID) as a Senior Research Fellow in London and acting as a consultant to many international organizations, including the International Organization for Migration (IOM), the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), the United Nations Population Division, the Bauhinia Foundation Research Centre in Hong Kong, the Social Science Research Council of New York, the European Commission in Brussels and the International Centre for Migration and Policy Development (ICMPD). He has published widely on issues around migration and lives in Nairn, Scotland.



Kristof Tamas

Kristof Tamas is Director of Delmi, the Swedish Migration Studies Delegation, an independent committee that initiates studies and supplies research results as a basis for future migration policy decisions and to contribute to public debate. He was previously senior adviser in the secretariat for the Swedish chairmanship of the Global Forum on Migration and Development, a Swedish national expert at the EU Commission, an independent research consultant at the Institute for Futures Studies in Stockholm, and a special adviser and later deputy director at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Justice. He has over 20 years of experience and expertise in international and global collaboration in the field of migration, with an emphasis on migration and development, and labour migration. His latest book is titled *Bridging the Gaps: Linking Research to Public Debates and Policy Making on Migration and Integration*, with Martin Ruhs and Joakim Palme (eds.) by Oxford University Press.



Leah Vosko

Leah F. Vosko is Professor and a Tier 1 Canada Research Chair in the Political Economy of Gender and Work at York University, Canada. Her research examines employment standards enforcement and deportability among workers labouring transnationally. She is currently principal investigator of Closing the Enforcement Gap: Improving Protections for People in Precarious Jobs, a SSHRC Partnership Grant concerned with employment standards enforcement; the Canada Labour Code-Data Analysis Infrastructure (CLC-DAI), an initiative involving a partnership with the Government of Canada's Labour Program, funded by the Canadian Foundation for Innovation and the Ontario Research Fund; and three research and teaching databases – the Gender and Work Database (GWD), the Comparative Perspectives Database (CPD), and the Employment Standards Database (ESD). Her new sole authored book, *Disrupting Deportability: Transnational Workers Organize* (2019) is published by Cornell University Press and her new coauthored book, *Closing the Enforcement Gap: Improving Employment Standards Protections for People in Precarious Job* (2020), is published by University of Toronto Press.



Christiane Kuptsch

Christiane Kuptsch works as Senior Specialist in Migration Policy at the International Labour Office in Geneva, having joined the ILO in 1992. Since 2008, she is with the ILO's Labour Migration Branch, inter alia responsible for coordinating research activities; she is also a member of the ILO's Future of Work Team, created in 2016. From 2008 to 2013 she served on the Academic Advisory Board of the Zeit Stiftung's *Settling Into Motion – The Bucerius Ph.D. Scholarship Programme in Migration Studies*, and she has been a member of the International Advisory Board of the journal *Population, Space and Place* since 2007. She is a political scientist, specialized in International Relations (Graduate Institute of International Studies, Geneva), with a background in law (University of Hamburg). Her publications examine issues such as the protection of migrant workers; student migration; migrants' labour market integration; inequalities and migrant workers; labour migration governance; migrant recruitment agents; the competition for highly skilled workers; questions of migration and development; and the internationalization of labour markets. Her forthcoming book is *"The future of diversity"*, co-edited with Eric Charest (PUQ & ILO).



Fabiola Mieres

Fabiola Mieres is Technical Officer at the Labour Migration Branch, ILO. She was previously a postdoctoral researcher at the Industrial Labor Relations School at Cornell University (2018) and held a Post-Doctoral Associate Position at the Department of Geography in Durham University in the UK (2014-2016) where she was part of the EU-funded consortium Demand-AT researching initiatives that address human trafficking and forced labour in global supply chains. She was also a Global Project Coordinator for the Building and Woodworkers' International looking at labour standards in the forestry sector. She holds a PhD in Politics from the University of Manchester in the UK, and her main areas of research and publications include the political economy of migration, labour recruitment, temporary migration, forced labour in global supply chains and multistakeholder initiatives. She has conducted field research in Mexico, the United States, Qatar, and Malaysia.
