# Soft Launch of the Caribbean Virtual Policy Network

## on Youth Education and Employment

Dear Network Member,

The Caribbean Virtual Policy Network on Youth Education and Employment (VPNYEE) is a new initiative spearheaded by the United Nations system and co-convened by the CARICOM Secretariat, the Caribbean Employers' Confederation, the ILO and UNESCO. Its primary goal is to help countries and stakeholders specify and understand which public policy interventions effectively support youth employment. It aspires to put youth employment at the center of the national policy discourse through the promotion of well-informed and evidence-based practices. The network activities will be rolled out in three phases:

- 1) Starting in 2017, a solid and extended knowledge base on youth employment interventions will be built and made available to the public;
- 2) During the first half of 2018, and in the following months, one or more monitoring and evaluation clinics will be held to support country-led programmes and interventions in designing their own monitoring and evaluation systems;
- 3) During the second half of 2018, and following months, youth employment programmes based on state of the art evidence will be designed and implemented.

Instrumental to the first phase will be the launching of a new information sharing tool to be hosted by the web-based UNESCO SDG 4 -8 TEAMSNET platform. This instrument will contain policy and programme documents as well as the latest research. The Platform will be activated on 15 December, 2017 however we invite you to register from 4 December, 2017 by following this <u>weblink</u>.

On 15 December, 2017 at 10:00am (Eastern Caribbean Time), the first VPNYEE webinar will be held. The theme is *"Designing effective programmes to promote youth entrepreneurship"*. In the spirit of the VPNYE, emphasis will be placed on key design and implementation features, discussing experiences and lessons learned from relevant stakeholders. The presentations will be followed by questions and answers from the audience. For further details, the event flyer is attached.

Christina has over 25 years of experience in both the public and private sectors working on economic and community development, with a focus on labour market policies, entrepreneurship, job training, and enhancing investment in small businesses through seed and venture capital.
- Dr. Borhene Chakroun is Head of Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) at UNESCO leading the implementation of the UNESCO TVET strategy. Before joining UNESCO, he worked in the area of TVET and skills development with various organizations. His most recent work focuses on global trends in reforming TVET systems and global agenda for skills development in the context of the 2030 Sustainable Development Agenda.
- Ms. Nadja Nutz is the Global Coordinator for the ILO's "Start and Improve your Business (SIYB)" entrepreneurship training programme since June 2016. She has joined the ILO in September 2014 as Associate Expert working on Value Chain Development (VCD).
