The two defining challenges of the 21st century

- Averting dangerous climate change and protecting lifesupport on earth
- Creating jobs, decent work, wellbeing and dignity for the excluded

The decent work challenge

- 1.3 billion working poor (< \$2/day)
 - = 43% global labor force
- Unemployed: 190 m globally
- Young job seekers: > 500 m new job
- 5.3 billion with no social security
- 1.6 billion without access to energy
- 1 billion slum dwellers
- Job seekers next 10 years



Addressing climate change requires a major shift in the way the world produces and consumes.

This structural change will have significant impacts on enterprises and workers, both negative and positive.

Millions of workers in Asia involved in hazardous waste recycling (e-waste, lead and other heavy metals, etc.) in the informal sector.



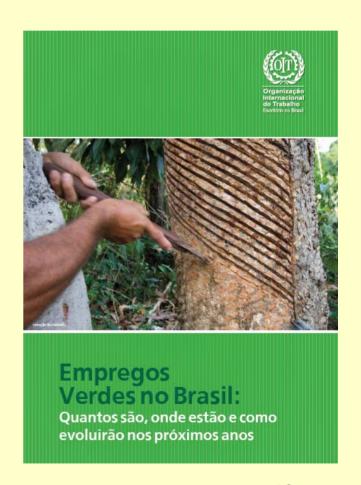
A multi-dimentional, dynamic, concept

- Green stimulus: social housing

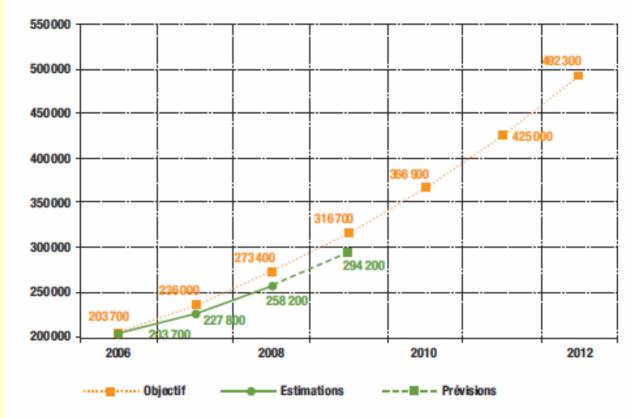


France

- 'Poles of (green) growth', including for the poor, men and women

Potential areas for green jobs creation to be explored further



- Labor intensive infrastructure development programs, that contribute to climate mitigation/adaptation objectives
- Green social housing programs
- Sustainable tourism, rural areas
- transport means for the poor in urban areas
- Decentralized sustainable waste management in small and medium range cities
