Prof Gulshan Sachdeva is Jean Monnet Chair and Director, Europe Area Studies Programme, School of International Studies at Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), New Delhi. He is also Editor-in-Chief of *International Studies*. He headed the ADB and the Asia Foundation projects at the Afghanistan Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Kabul (2006-2010). Earlier he was Chairperson, Centre for European Studies and Director Energy Studies Programme at JNU. His research interests include the European Union, Eurasian integration, Afghanistan, development cooperation and energy security. He was Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR) Chair on Contemporary India at the University of Leuven; and Visiting Professor at the University of Warsaw, University of Trento, University of Antwerp, Corvinus University of Budapest and Mykolas Romers University, Vilnius. He has written many project reports for industry and government ministries and published more than 100 research papers in academic journals and edited books. His recent publications include *India in a Reconnecting Eurasia* (Washington: CSIS, 2016) and *Evaluation of the EU-India Strategic Partnership and the Potential for its Revitalization* (Brussels: European Parliament, 2015). He is a regular contributor to print and broadcast media on both economic and security issues. He holds PhD in Economics from the Hungarian Academy of Sciences.



Mr Martijn Pluim started his career with ICMPD in 1999 after writing his thesis about the role of informal migration dialogues in policy harmonisation. As project manager, he worked among others on protection, fight against trafficking, border management and coordinated the work on the Budapest Process working group on the nexus between irregular migration and asylum. From 2005 to 2007, he worked at the European Commission (DG AidCo) in the Quality Support Unit, supporting EU Delegations on project related to border management, trafficking in human beings and long-term displacement. He returned to ICMPD in 2007 as Director in charge of Capacity Building and Operations. Between 2010 and 2016, he was the ICMPD Director for the Eastern Dimension. As well as overseeing ICMPD's capacity-building projects in Eastern Europe and Asia, he also supervised the Secretariats for both the Prague and Budapest Processes, including the latter's reorientation towards the Silk Routes countries. Presently, as ICMPD Director for Migration Dialogues and Cooperation, he is in charge of all ICMPD operational projects globally (50+ projects, 200+ staff, 17 locations), covering all thematic areas of migration. In his present role, he also coordinates the teams that support all informal intergovernmental migration dialogues supported by ICMPD. These include the Prague Process, the Budapest Process, the Khartoum Process, the Rabat Process and the EU-Africa continental dialogue. He also supervises ICMPD's support to the post-Valetta process as well as the support projects for the EU-India migration dialogue and Iran.



Dr Constantino Xavier is a Fellow in Foreign Policy Studies at Brookings India in New Delhi and the Brookings Institution in Washington DC. He researches on India's foreign and security policies as a regional power, with a focus on institutions and decision-making processes, and also on relations with Europe. Xavier's research also focuses on how India's democratic values and institutions influence its external engagements and its relations with other democratic powers.

Previously, he worked at the Brookings Institution, in Washington DC, as a media correspondent in South Asia, and as an adviser to the Embassy of Portugal in New Delhi during the presidency of the European Union. He held fellowships at the Institute for Defence Studies and Analyses and the Observer Research Foundation, in New Delhi, and received research awards from the United States Fulbright program and the Indian Council for Cultural Relations. Xavier holds a Ph.D. in South Asian studies from the Johns Hopkins University, School of Advanced International Studies.
