



## Gender gaps in the labour market **Indonesia**

### Gender gaps in Indonesia persist

The female participation rate in Indonesia is estimated at 51 per cent in 2017. This is 32.7 percentage points below their male counterparts (which stands at 83.7 per cent). The gap is higher than the global average of 26.7 percentage points (table 1).

### Closing the gap would bring additional 4.7 per cent in GDP and US\$ 30.5 billion (Rp 406 trillion) in tax revenue

If the gap in participation rates could be closed by 25 per cent by 2025 (G20 commitment), the ILO estimates that it could add Rp 2.9 quadrillion (US\$ 216.2 billion) to the Indonesian economy. In other words, by simply raising female participation rates by 8.2 percentage points, this would add 8.6 million women to the labour force and boost GDP.

### Improving female participation requires a multi-dimensional approach

This includes, among others, introducing policies that improve work-family balance, prevent and eliminate discrimination based on gender as well as create and protect quality jobs in the care economy.
